



- Consent to treatment closer alignment to ADM AHDs -'Nominated person' – info has to be in a form and language the person understands
- New Part relating to Children including consent for 16/17yr olds
- More rights around individual care plans
- Psycho-social assessments more holistic approach •

2024 Bill

Medical/Legal/Community Panels

Tightening of renewal orders – max 3 months at a time

Top 3 2024 Bill

Top 3 changes to welcome

- 1. Guiding principles and language changes
- Expansion of the regulatory remit of the Mental Health Commission 2.
- 3. Nominated person/supporter

Top 3 changes for clarification

- 1. Prohibition of admitting children in adult psychiatric units
- **Independent Complaints Mechanism** 2.
- **3.** Statutory Right to Advocacy

Top 3 things MHR calling for

- 1. Bill to be debated at Second Stage from September 18th
- 2. Bill to pass Second Stage and proceed to Committee Stage asap
- 3. Respectful debate and non-stigmatizing language





We at Mental Health Reform are a coalition of Voluntary and Community Sector organisations. We are not legislators. The content of the legislation is dictated by the Government. There has been extensive consultation on the Bill over a decade and many of the changes were recommended by an Expert Review Group in 2015.

• There is already a HSE Consent Policy which must be followed by HSE services.

There is already an Assisted Decision-Making (Capacity) Act 2015, rights to supported decision making, and a presumption of capacity. This law has been operating since April 2023. You, or your loved one, might be entitled to a decision support arrangement. Contact the Decision Support Service for more information.

• 16 & 17yr olds can already consent to, or refuse, medical and dental treatment. The proposed change in this Bill will add 'mental'. It will not change your opportunities to support your child. In fact, this Bill will strengthen your rights, with your loved one's consent, to information.
